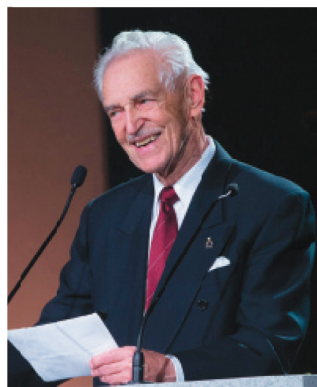
THE CIMF NEEDS YOUR SUPPORT!

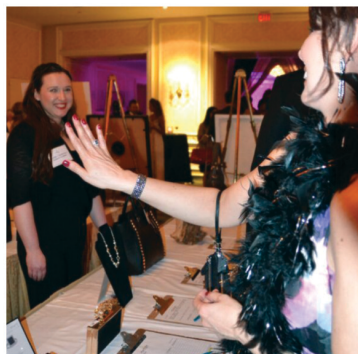

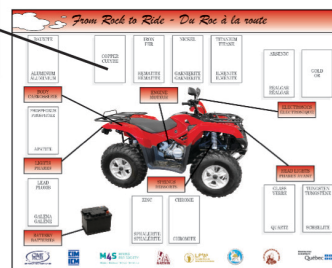

CIMF TAILORS WORKSHOPS TO COMMUNITIES IN REMOTE LOCATIONS

In addition to supporting the M4S Educational Show presented in Montreal, in May 2015 in conjunction with the CIM Annual Conference and as part of the CIM Foundation's efforts to support CIM Branches, Societies and Corporate Members, —including those situated in remote locations, the following mini-M4S workshops were organized by the CIM Foundation.

THE KUUJJUAQ MINING WORKSHOP 2015, APRIL 28–30, 2015

The CIM Foundation was invited to organize educational workshops in Kuujuaq, Québec in collaboration with several key community organizations including: the Kativik School Board, the Kativik Regional Government, the Nunavik Mineral Exploration Fund and the Makivik Corporation. This was the third time the Foundation was invited to Kuujuaq—a key community in Nunavik that will benefit from mining activities north of their town. The following workshops were presented: 1) cookie mining, 2) minerals in our daily lives, 3) pentlandite and the mining cycle, 4) the oldest rock in the world, (which is from their region), 5) careers and available scholarships, 6) pin a mineral on a

mine site, 7) Hewitt and the Caterpillar Simulator, and 8) respect for the environment and clean-up of old mine sites. These activities were meant to help inform and interest the communities in geology and in potential mining projects in their regions. Packages of 10 mineral cards chosen by the Kativik school board were produced in syllabics and distributed

to everyone. The kiosks were first presented to the students of the Jaanimmarik school and then to members of the public from across Nunavik and Labrador regions who were present at the Community Hall where the Kuujuaq Mining Workshop 2015 was being held.

Nancy Dea, environmental consultant and Project Coordinator for the Kativik Regional Government, presented recent work she and her team accomplished in the Nunavik area. The clean-up of abandoned mining sites is important, and she explained the new laws that ensure that mine sites are properly managed from the planning stage to the closing and restoration of the sites. Students interested in summer work with Nancy were encouraged to apply for jobs that were available, and many did!

THE 3RD ANNUAL RICHESSES NATURELLES EN DÉCOUVERTE, SEPTEMBER 11–13, 2015

The CIM Foundation Manager and volunteers were invited to travel to Chibougamou to present mining workshops during their annual natural resources weekend. The Foundation presented the following workshops: 1) cookie mining, 2) minerals in our daily lives, 3) scholarships, 4) Hewitt and the Caterpillar Simulator, and 5) carbon in three 'C's-coal, graphite and diamonds. Bingo is a huge pastime in Chibougamou and the closing event was Mineral Bingo under the Big Top! The game was a hit and playing was a family affair. The caller was long-time CIM Branch President, Patrick Houle, who also works for the Natural Resources Department of the Government of Québec. He was able to annotate the bingo game with information about local mining initiatives, or about the minerals and how they are important to us all. The game was given to the CIM Branch and they will use it throughout the year, and lend it to other groups for special events (Kiwanis, Rotary Club, etc.).
